

Medication Aide – Adult Care Facility General Information

Anyone administering medications to residents in adult care homes, assisted living facilities or family care homes in North Carolina who is not authorized by occupational laws to administer medications must complete the medication aide examination for adult care facilities.

Medication aides in adult care facilities operate under the adult care home licensure rules and statutes.

A listing on the North Carolina Medication Aide Registry for Adult Care facilities does not qualify an individual to administer medications in a nursing home.

A listing on the North Carolina Medication Aide Registry for Nursing Home facilities does not qualify an individual to administer medications in an adult care facility.

A listing on the North Carolina Medication Aide Registry for Adult Care Facilities does not expire and does not need to be renewed.

Employer (Adult Care Facility) Responsibility

Before allowing a medication aide to work in an adult care facility, the following activities must be completed:

- Verify that the person is listed on the North Carolina Medication Aide Registry for Adult Care facilities.
- Verify that the person has no substantiated findings on the North Carolina Health Care Personnel Registry.
- Keep a record of accessing the above registries (i.e., the date and confirmation number assigned during access) in your business files.
- A clinical skills validation (conducted by a Registered Nurse) is required for the medication tasks to be performed in the facility.
